What is a Learning Toolkit?

- •A collection of tools, templates, and resources
- Helps capture, apply, and share learning consistently
- Builds institutional memory
- •Supports sustainability beyond the FEF-OSC program











Why It Matters for CSOs

- Prevents reinventing the wheel
 - Captures successes and lessons learned
- Supports onboarding new staff

Strengthens credibility with donors and partners
