Overview of Gender-Based Violence

Gender-Based Violence (GBV) continues to be a serious global issue affecting mostly women and girls. GBV refers to any harmful act carried out against someone without consent due to gender differences and imbalances of power.

Globally, 35% of women have experienced physical or sexual intimate partner violence or sexual violence by a non-partner.

in Nigeria, 30% of women and girls aged 15–49 have faced sexual abuse





Our Solution



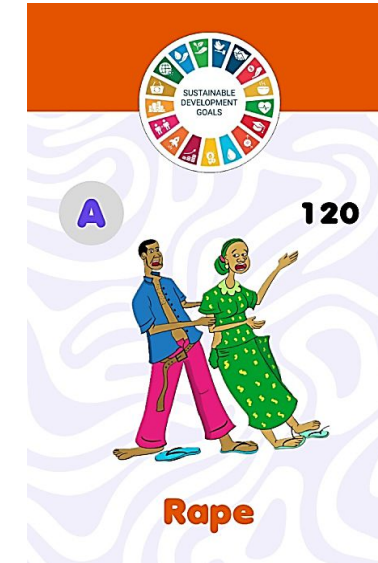
The **GBV Avengers game** promotes understanding of GBV issues and preventive actions through an interactive and fun approach. It educates the society to contribute to tackling gender-based violence in Nigeria.



Game Structure

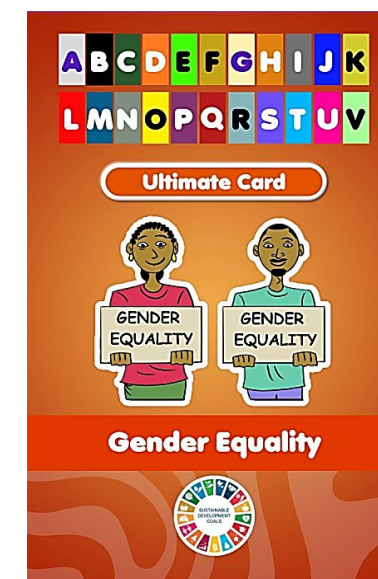
Problem card

- **Total Number of Cards:** 22 unique problem cards (2 copies each), making 44 problem cards.
- **Card Features:** Each problem card highlights a significant issue related to GBV and has an alphabetical code and an index number showing its severity. Higher index numbers indicate more severe GBV issues.



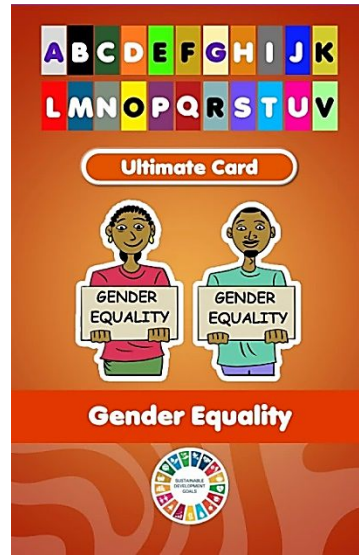
Solution card

- **Total Number of Cards:** 10 unique solution cards (2 copies each) and 2 ULTIMATE CARDS (2 copy each), making 22 cards in total.
- **Identification:** Each solution card lists the problem codes (alphabets) it can solve and includes visual cues to help players connect solutions with problems.

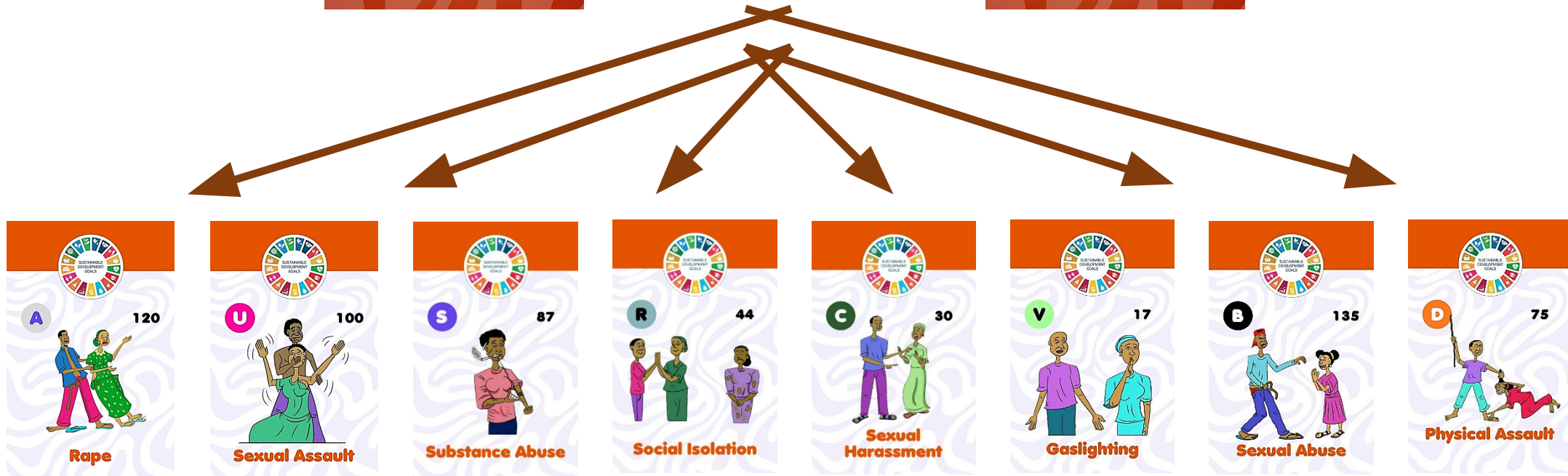
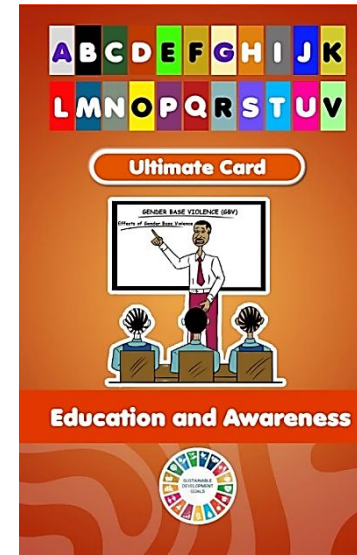




Game Structure cont.



Ultimate Cards: These cards “Education and Awareness” and “Gender Equality” can address any problem related to GBV in the game.





Playing Instructions

How to Play

1. Shuffle all cards thoroughly.
2. Distribute an equal number of cards to each player (minimum of 2, maximum of 5 cards).
3. Start the game by placing a problem card on the table.
4. The first player plays a solution card that can address the problem on the table and explains how it helps.
5. After playing a solution card, the player places another problem card to continue the round. If they don't have a solution card for the new problem, they must draw one from the deck.
6. Players take turns following this format.
7. If a player holds multiple identical problem cards, they can play them together after using a solution card.
8. A player wins (CHECKMATE) by playing their last problem card.
9. If a player only has solution cards left, they must announce it to other players and CHECKMATE on their next turn.
10. When a player wins, other players count their remaining problem cards. Points are awarded: the winner receives 5 points, and others receive 3, 2, or 1 points based on their remaining cards.
11. Multiple rounds can be played, and the player with the most points at the end is declared the CHAMPION.



Rules of GBV Avengers

- **Number of Players:** Minimum of 2, maximum of 5.
- **Ultimate Cards:** If a player holds an ultimate card, they may play two different problem cards in one turn.
- **No Cheating:** Players caught hiding or looking at others' cards must be evicted from the game.
- **Explanation Rule:** Players must explain how their solution card addresses the problem card before playing it.





GBV Avengers Dictionary

GBV Avengers Dictionary just as the name implies, explains the problems, solutions and GBV statistics as highlighted in the game.

Example “Problem”

Sexual Harassment: This is any unwanted sexual behavior that makes someone feel uncomfortable or unsafe. This can include comments, gestures, or touching.

Physical Assault: Beating, punching, kicking, biting, burning, maiming, or killing, with or without weapon, often used in combination with other forms of sexual & gender-based violence.

Example “solution”

Education and Awareness: The process of acquiring knowledge and skills through teaching and learning or the state of being conscious of GBV.

Report Assault/Abuse: This means telling the authorities, like the police or a trusted organisation, when someone has been hurt or treated badly. It helps take action against the person responsible and provides support to the victim.
