What is Programme Quality?

- Clear objectives & logical frameworks (ToC/logframe)
- Beneficiary/participant focus (People-centred design and delivery)
- Strong MEAL systems: monitor, evaluate, learn, stay accountable
- Know your risks and adaptability to context









Why Programme Quality Matters

- Ensures real impact and accountability
- Builds donor and stakeholder confidence
- Strengthens organisational learning and improvement



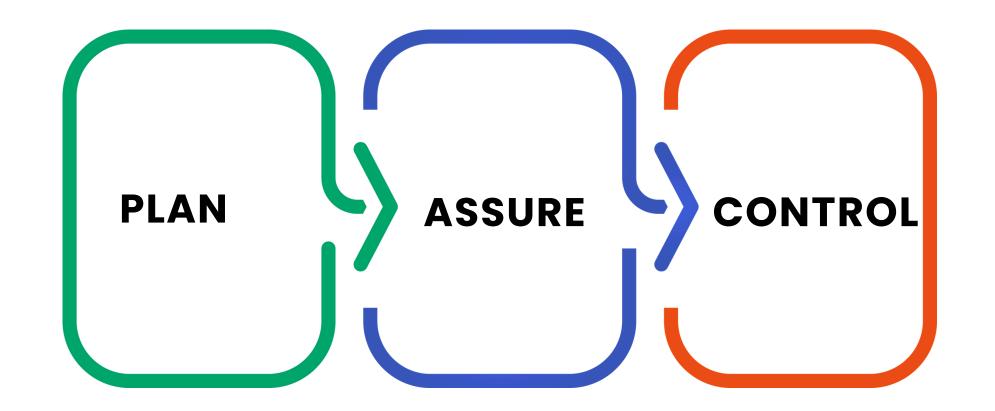






Project Quality Management (PQM)

- Quality Planning set standards (ToC, logframes, MEAL)
- Quality Assurance embed reviews, peer checks, accountability systems
- Quality Control monitor data, feedback loops, after-action reviews









Organisational Processes that Align with PQM

- Strategic Planning
- Performance Management & HR Development
- Monitoring, Evaluation & Learning (MEAL) Systems
- Knowledge Management & Continuous Learning
- Risk Management & Governance

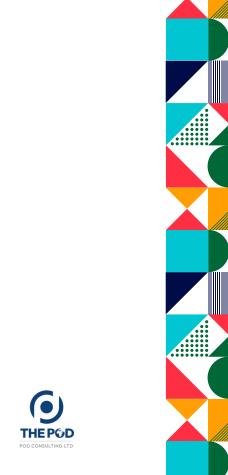


Peer Champions for Learning

- Circuit Pointe embeds M&E in projects; refining ToC
- Youth Adolescent Health Initiative baseline/midline/endline assessments
- Hopes Alive Initiative professional M&E officer; feedback loops
- ESERC measures GBV case reporting; improving data analysis
- Community Health Initiative integrates evaluations; online staff learning

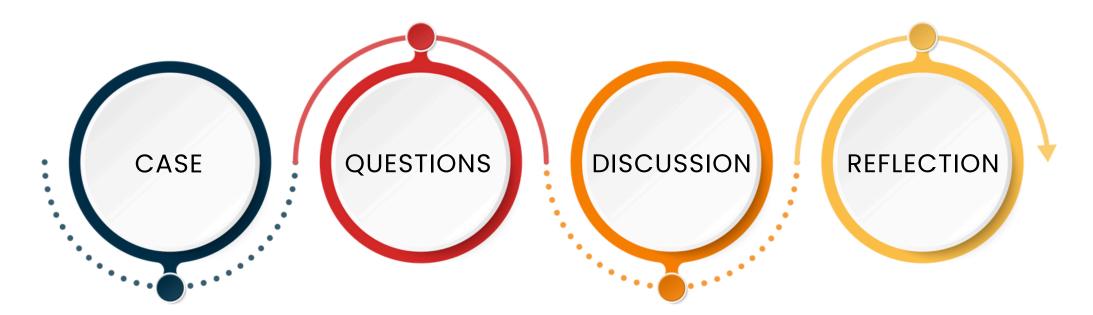






Peer-to-Peer Exchange: One Big Challenge

What is Adaptive Management



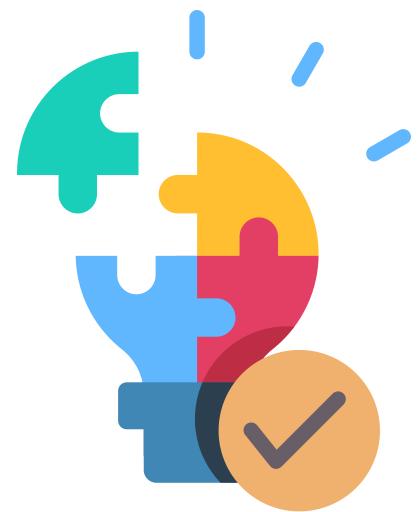






Core Principles of Adaptive Management

- Focus on outcomes
- Evidence and learning
- Flexibility in plans
- Collaboration and inclusivity
- Iteration and responsiveness



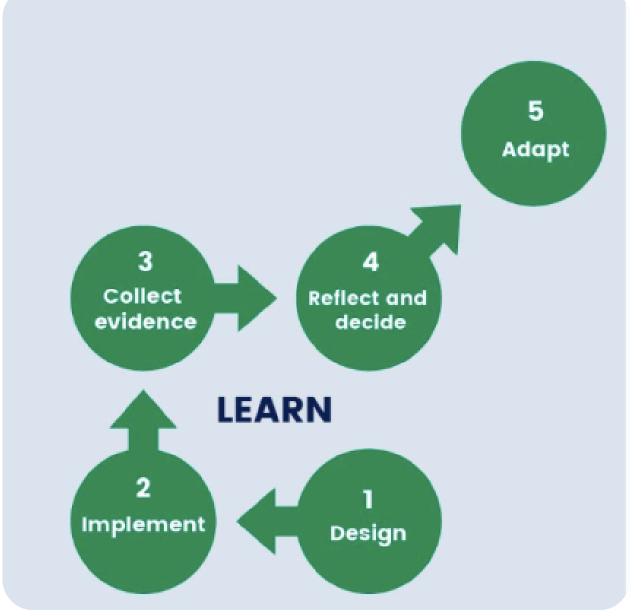






Core Principles of Adaptive Management

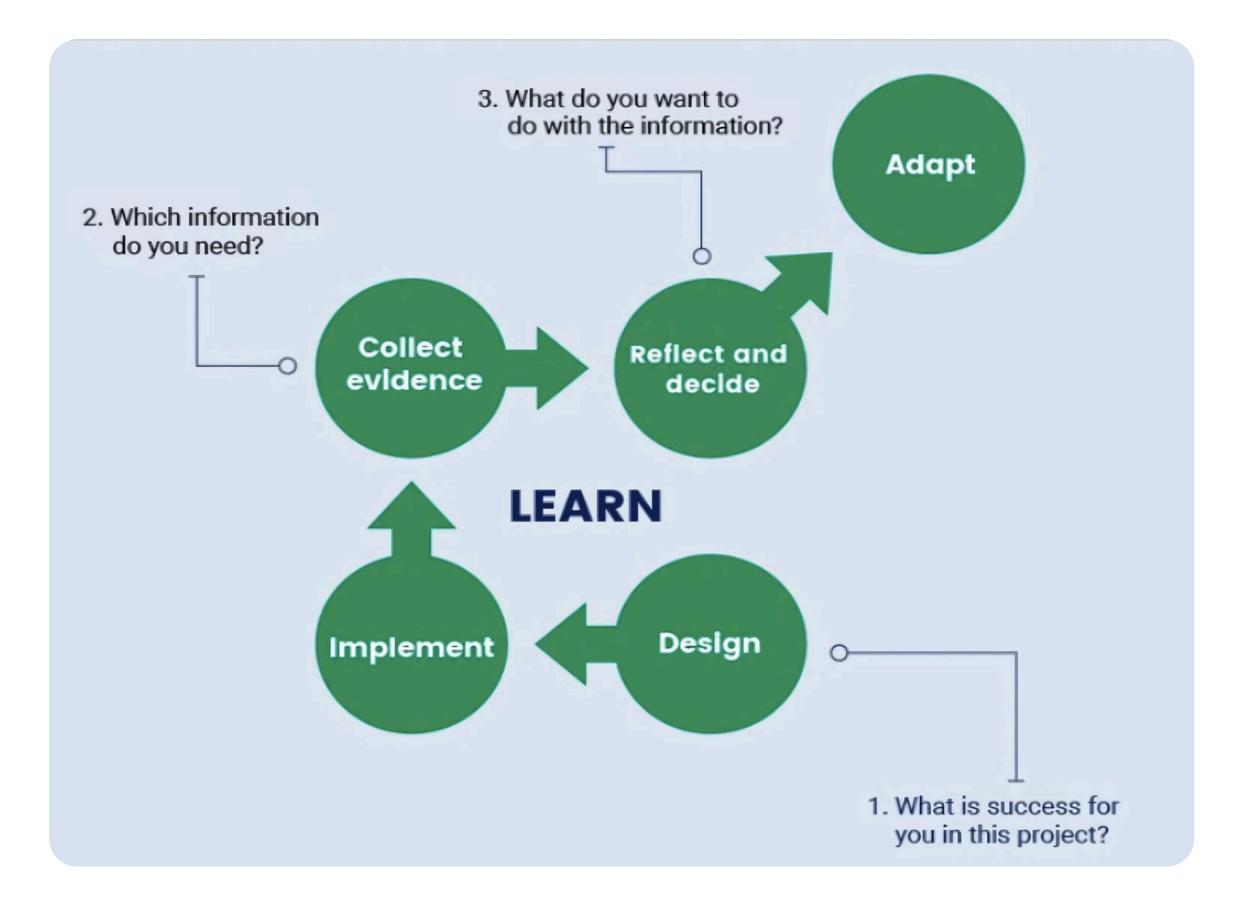
Adaptation isn't a one-off fix but an ongoing cycle of Plan (Design) → Implement → Learn → Adapt.

















Triggers for Adaptation

When do we know it's time to pivot?

- New risks, community feedback, donor priorities, or unexpected political shifts.
- List others from experience









Case Study: Girls' School Retention (Kaduna State)

- 80% of activities implemented (mentorship, training, hygiene kits)
- Midline: no improvement in attendance
- Mentorship poorly attended; parents still resistant
- Insecurity caused repeated school closures







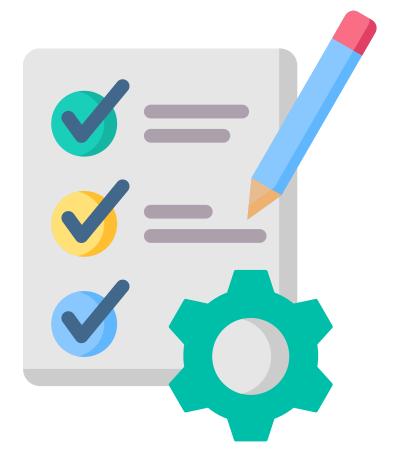
